Who We Are

The Ashford Choraliers/Ecumenical Choir is a group of community members who enjoy singing. As the Choraliers our group performs in the annual Ashford Memorial Day parade and celebration program. As the Ecumenical Choir we sing at the annual Thanksgiving Ecumenical service which alternates amongst the St. Phillip, Westford Congregational and Ashford Baptist churches. The core of our group comes from the choirs of these three churches, but everyone who enjoys singing is welcome to join.

The Ashford Choraliers also perform at special Town events such as the dedication of the Senior Center, the September 11th Remembrance Program and the annual Christmas Carol Sing and lighting of the town Christmas Tree.

We officially formed in 1975, to help the town of Ashford to celebrate the Bicentennial anniversary of our country. We performed a concert of American music ranging from the Psalter to contemporary selections. We performed a similar concert again in 1976.

When We Meet

As a general rule, we begin rehearsals approximately one month prior to each event. Check the Ashford Citizen or your church bulletin for event announcements.

Rehearsals are normally held for one hour beginning at 7:00 pm in a lower level meeting room in the new Town administrative building. Music sheets and folders are provided. Our musical selections are carefully chosen to be interesting, appropriate for the occasion, and not overly difficult (we want to make this fun with an appropriate level of challenge!). Sopranos, altos, bases and tenors are particularly welcome.
